Nothing is sadder than one who refuses the call to "Follow Me." Feeling more than obedience to formal religion's precepts, the rich young ruler came to Jesus, asking, "What must I do to be saved?" To which Jesus replied, "If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come and follow me." I can feel the heaviness of Matthew's report that this young man "went away sorrowful: for he had great possessions." Some have said that "great possessions had him." Is there anything that "pos-

"Follow Me" is also a call to intimacy and growth in this new life with Jesus. It's much more than formal religion; it's a call to walk with Christ through trials and joys, through temptation and peace. It's not a one and done kind of thing; it's an invitation to intimacy with our Lord and Saviour, a command to day by day "walk ye in him: Rooted and built up in Him...abounding therein with thanksgiving." (Col. 2:6-7) It's a living relationship which requires communication. time in His presence, and a commitment to not hinder that relationship in any way. If/when we do, we humble ourselves, asking for forgiveness and repent of that hindrance.

It's this longing for intimacy with Jesus that drives us to prayer; Bible reading, study, and meditation: devotions: and leads us to devotion to Him who suffered, died, rose again, ascended into heaven, and will one day return to take His own with Him to Heaven. Believers have a burning

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desire to answer His call of "Follow Me" with a "Yes," of utter abandon.

M'Cheyne explains: "A believer longs after God, to come into His presence, to feel His love, to feel in the crowd that He is nearer than all the creatures. Ah! Dear brethren, have you ever tasted this blessedness? There is greater rest and solace to be found in the presence of God for one hour than in an eternity in the presence of man."

The closer we heed the call to "Follow Me," the more experientially we know and feel the depths of Jesus' love for us, which in turn, strengthens our desire and tenacity to follow Him "beside the still waters," through "the valley of the shadow of death," and even through death's door into His blessed presence. How glorious that will be!

> Extra-biblical accounts tell of the persecution he went through, fulfilling Jesus' words: "Ye shall indeed drink of the cup that I drink of; and with the baptism that I am baptized withal shall ye be baptized." (Mark 10:39) He was banished to Patmos where he had no companions, except Jesus, whom he followed, worshiped, and loved. For John, Jesus was truly enough! It was here that he was given a promise to share with the church: "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life." (Rev. 2:10)

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
